NURSERY

It has been a really lovely Spring 2 term leading up to the Easter holidays full of enthusiasm and learning from the Nursery children.

Religious Education

This term in Religious Education during our unit entitled 'Desert to Garden', we explored the story of Jesus during his 40 days and nights in the desert, Lent: its meaning and how it helps us grow closer to God, and Palm Sunday the Easter story. We looked at plant growth and different plants in the desert compared to England and reflected on the theme of growing in love with Jesus and how we can all try to be the best versions of ourselves, just as he taught us. Through these lessons, children learnt about kindness, self-reflection, and caring for others. They loved creating depictions of stories from the Bible using water colours, developing their funky fingers by carefully cutting their palm leaves and making Easter themed crafts.

Understanding of the World

In our understanding of the world learning we explored the topic of Vets and People Who Help Us. This topic focused on the important roles of vets and other people who help us. Children learnt about the different types of helpers in our communities and the vital work they do. They loved all roleplaying the veterinary surgery roleplay alongside all the other hands-on activities that encouraged children to understand empathy, responsibility, and caring for animals and people in need including bandaging their friends and teachers in class.

Literacy

Our talk for writing books in English have been animal and vet themed. We read lots of exciting animal-themed books such as Mog and the Vet, The Dinosaur Vet, and Hairy McClary. These stories supported the children's understanding of animals, their needs, and the role of vets. Through these books the children developed their listening, comprehension, and vocabulary skills. They thoroughly enjoyed retelling the stories through a range of different mediums such as using story spoons in the puppet theatre and joining in with the repeated refrains in Hairy McClary which was the most popular book covered this term.

Maths

This half term we have been continuing to look at Shapes and Comparing Size/Length of people and objects. The children explored a range of different 2D shapes and learnt how to compare the size and length of objects using rulers, tape measures as well as cubes, hands etc. They love ordering themselves in height, drawing around one another and counting how tall they were using a range of measuring apparatus. Through these fun, interactive activities we encouraged the Nursery children to recognize different shapes, understand concepts of bigger and smaller, and develop early measurement skills.

Personal social and emotional development

This half term working hand in hand with our RE topic 'growing in the love of Jesus' we thought about how we could be the best version of ourselves over Lent this was explored through two different topics. Firstly, how to look after our bodies: through exercise, healthy diet and teeth brushing and secondly by understanding out emotions. Using the book In My Heart, children discussed their feelings, identified how we express emotions, and learnt how to be a kind and supportive friend to others. This will be an important part of their social and emotional development as they navigate relationships with peers. The children loved linking their emotions to different colours, creating friendship themed crafts based on their friends and their own emotion and brushing the different teeth models in class.

Phonics

This half term in phonics, we were excited to continue supporting your child's early reading and writing development. In our phonics lessons, we focused on phase 1 elements as well as introducing the following sounds: ck, e, u, r, h, and b. These sounds will help children to build a strong foundation for blending and segmenting words, an essential skill for reading and writing as they continue their school journey. The Nursery children have been early mark making in the craft, funky finger and writing areas. They have been writing and drawing around the whole Nursery environment in the roleplay area when answering phone calls and designing their builds in the builder's yard on squared paper.

We have had so much fun with our learning in Nursery this half term and look forward to an exciting and enriching Summer 1 term where we will be getting to experience the joy of spring and new life first hand with the incredible eggs duck hatching experience! Thank you for your continued support.

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RECEPTION

In Reception we have had a term full of exploration, creativity, and learning, and we are incredibly proud of the progress the children have made.

In Literacy, we began by diving into the world of dinosaurs with the story of *Harry and his Bucket Full of Dinosaurs*. The children were fascinated by the adventures of Harry and his dinosaurs, and we brought the theme to life in the classroom by setting up a palaeontology lab and a dinosaur museum. It was a fantastic way to encourage curiosity and imaginative play. Later, we experienced an unexpected alien crash landing right outside our classrooms! After hearing a loud crash, the children rushed outside to discover a spaceship had landed, with an alien hiding in a bush. They were so excited that they couldn't wait to write about what they had seen. Our space topic continued with the book *Astro Girl*, where we created a story map and the children had the opportunity to innovate and develop their own version of the story. We also had space stations set up in the classroom which the children really enjoyed exploring. We then moved on to *Supertato*, a fun story about a brave vegetable superhero. The children loved role-playing with fruit and vegetables, and we set up a shop in the classroom where they could act out their own supermarket adventures. We have been so impressed with the lovely writing the children have produced throughout these topics.

In Maths, we focused on numbers from 5 to 10, and the children explored a variety of concepts such as mass, capacity, length, height, and time. The children particularly enjoyed the practical lessons, and it was wonderful to see them applying their learning outside the classroom as well. Whether measuring objects, comparing sizes, or experimenting with volume. The children were fully engaged and had lots of fun with the hands-on activities.

With the weather becoming warmer, we have spent more time outdoors, and the children have thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to be active and creative. They have loved designing and completing obstacle courses, and many have enjoyed playing on the new climbing equipment and going on the field. It has been wonderful to see them enjoying their time outside and developing their physical skills.

In Religious Education, we focused on the theme of Lent. The children learned that Lent is a time for growing closer to Jesus and for showing care and love for others. We discussed the events of Jesuses entry into Jerusalem on a donkey, His sacrifice on the cross, and His resurrection, which we celebrated.


It has been a wonderful term, and the children have shown incredible enthusiasm and dedication to their learning. We would like to thank you for your continued support throughout the term.

YEAR ONE

Religious Education

<u>Desert to Garden:</u> The children learnt about the events leading up to Easter and Holy week. The stories the children studied included Jesus being tempted by the devil, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, The Last supper, the Crucifixion and death of Jesus. The children looked at the importance of these events and how they fitted in to God's plan for his world.

English:

The children studied the text "Meerkat Mail" where they learnt the structure of how to write a letter and the language used in this style of writing. They continued to work on their handwriting as well as spelling, grammar and punctuation. They continued to apply their phonics knowledge in their reading and writing in all areas of the curriculum.

Maths

Place Value to 50

The children continued to further their knowledge in counting from 20 to 50, as well as understanding the numbers 20, 30, 40 and 50. They practiced counting by making groups of tens and looked at groups of tens and ones which included partitioning numbers into tens and ones. They looked at the number line to 50 and used this resource to estimate on a number line to 50 and solve one more and one less than problems.

Length and Height

The children compared lengths and heights of various items. They learnt to measure these items using standard (cm) and non-standard units (cubes, paperclips etc)

Mass and Volume

The children used language such as heavier and lighter whilst they measured the mass of objects and compared these masses. They used language such as full and empty when they discussed capacity and volume

Phonics

The children continued to work through the Floppy Phonics scheme, learning new phonemes and graphemes as well as consolidating prior knowledge. They have been applying their phonics knowledge in their reading and writing across all areas of the curriculum.

Science

The children started the topic of Everyday Materials and have looked at objects and the materials they are made of, examining the properties of these materials and why they are suited to the objects made from them.

Geography

The children looked at various weather conditions in the UK and the children furthered their knowledge on seasonal changes and why the weather is not the same all over the UK

DT

Windmills: the children looked at the structure of various windmills before designing and creating their own free standing windmill.

Computing

Digital writing: the children practiced using a computer to create and format text, before comparing that to writing created nondigitally.

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YEAR TWO

The Year Two team would like to say thank you to parents for your continued support this half term. It is very much appreciated. Below is just a flavour of what we have been up to over this half term. It has been packed with exciting learning opportunities!

Science

In Science, we have been exploring *living things and their habitats*. A highlight of our learning was a visit from *Feathers and Fur Falconry Centre*, where the children had the incredible opportunity to see four magnificent owls up close: a **barn owl, a tawny owl, a snowy owl, and a long-eared owl**. The children were fascinated to learn fun facts—did you know that the long-eared owl doesn't actually have long ears, but *plumicorns* on its head?



We have also been investigating *life processes* and exploring the microhabitats within our school grounds, discovering the different creatures that call them home.

Additionally, we were very fortunate to have a visit this term from **Mrs. Akar, who works at the UK Space Agency**. She led a fascinating workshop where the children learnt all about *space and our roles in looking after it*. They were completely engaged and inspired by the session, gaining valuable knowledge about the wonders of the universe!

English

In English, we have been busy writing *non-chronological reports* about **native nocturnal animals**, including bats, hedgehogs, and badgers. Our focus has been on varying sentence openers, using commas in lists, and wowing our readers with amazing facts. A huge well done to all the children for their fantastic *Homework Builder projects*—we have been amazed by the effort and creativity put into them!



YEAR TWO CONTINUED

World Book Day

We also celebrated **World Book Day**, which was a truly special event. The children came dressed as their favourite book characters, bringing stories to life with costumes inspired by *Alice in Wonderland, The Worst Witch, Little Red Riding Hood, Fantastic Mr. Fox,* and *Paddington Bear*. It was wonderful to see such enthusiasm for reading!



Maths

In Maths, we have been developing our understanding of *measurement*, comparing height, mass, and length using real-life objects in our classroom. Alongside this, children have also been busy consolidating their understanding of previously taught content, tackling a variety of **fluency and reasoning-based questions** to strengthen their mathematical thinking. Well done to all our Year 2 learners for their hard work and enthusiasm this half term!



YEAR THREE

In our Religious Education topic on Giving all, children learned how through Jesus' life, death and Resurrection He teaches us how to give ourselves to others. Children explored the thoughts and feelings of St Peter, his thoughts words and actions. We also discussed God's forgiveness and mercy, which far outweighs our poor choices and decisions.

In science, children have been learning about how we see objects and how shadows are formed. Children have planned an investigation and explored how long and short shadows are formed by moving the light source above and to the side of the object.

In Geography children learned about the continent Antarctica and where it was located on the world map. They learned to identify the hemispheres, various lines of latitude and where wet, dry and temperate zones were located. They also plotted the co-ordinates of how Shackleton would have travelled towards Antarctica. Identifying the 8 points on a compass helped them to navigate a route to designated areas on the school grounds.

In Design and Technology, children have been learning that a pneumatic system can force air over a distance to create movement.


The children were tasked with manipulating materials to create different effects on the toys by cutting, creasing, folding, joining, weaving, etc.

The children had a fantastic time creating some aesthetically pleasing designs.

YEAR FOUR

This term, Year 4 has been busy developing their discussion writing skills in English, debating topics such as whether children should have homework and whether we should buy imported or locally produced food. They then had the opportunity to choose their own topics to explore further.

In Maths, we tackled fractions and decimal numbers. Although it was a challenge, the children showed great confidence and found it easier than expected!

In RE, we focused on Lent, particularly Holy Week, and reflected on its significance for Christians today. Meanwhile, in Geography, we examined food packaging to discover just how far our food travels—some all the way from Brazil, India, and Peru!

PE has been full of excitement, with children developing their handball skills and thoroughly enjoying their swimming lessons.






YEAR FIVE

Design & Technology

In our DT lessons we have been learning how to build pop-up books. We have used technical pieces of equipment such as spacers, levers and raised steps to create movement on every page of our books. We worked in pairs to recreate the classic nursery rhyme, Jack and Gill' then we worked independently on a story of our choice. It was a challenging but fun project and we have been amazed at how much we were able to achieve in such a short time!







Science

In our science lessons, we have been learning about Earth and Space. It is a fascinating topic and we have learnt a lot about our solar system. Our Brain Builder projects were a fantastic mixture of models, written reports, pictures and PowerPoint presentations. Here is a selection of our fabulous projects:



<u> PE – Dance</u>

The children have been fortunate to have two wonderful students from Creative Academy come in and teach them modern dance moves and routines. Completing their dance degrees, the student's commitment and enthusiasm whilst teaching has shone through. Music played during the workshops have inspired your children, especially the boys to create an ensemble of dance routines that they will eventually be putting together in a performance in assembly to UKS in May.



YEAR SIX

<u>Science</u>

In Science this term, children in Year 6 have been learning about Living Things and their Habitats. Children have learnt about different ways to classify plants (such as seed dispersal, vascular or non-vascular, flowering or non-flowering) and animals (for example, vertebrate or invertebrate, diet, warm or cold blooded, land or water born and such). We then learnt about classification keys and practised devising these by sorting sweets, before moving onto animals. Another main type of living organism the children have studied is micro-organisms. We learnt about fungi, bacteria, viruses, algae and protozoa. In our final lesson of the topic, the pupils used laptops to research Carl Linnaeus, a famous Swedish scientist, who devised a taxonomy for classifying living things, giving each one a two-part Latin name. Did you know, he even gave us human beings our scientific name: homo sapiens!

<u>DT</u>

During Spring 2 in DT, the children have been designing and making their own model playgrounds. Firstly, we had to decide which free-standing apparatus we wanted to include – swings, climbing frames, slides, monkey bars and roundabouts were some of the most common! Some pupils even chose to include streams, ponds, sandpits or small areas of greenery in their designs. Following this, the pupils had to learn how to use handsaws safely and sensibly and then spend some time practise cutting pieces of wood. They were then able to begin constructing their various pieces of apparatus, before putting it all together on their base to create their model playground.

<u>RE</u>

The children have continued to look at the gospel of John and in particular the Passion of Christ. They have learnt how to deep read scripture to try and find the hidden messages and symbology hidden within to help them gain a deeper understanding of scripture. They then looked at how Jesus showed His love for all people through His words and actions in Holy week and showed us how to love each other. They also have created their own Stations of the Cross to reflect upon in this most important time of the Catholic calendar.

Geography

This term the children have looked at the vitally important issues involving Energy. They have learnt to understand the differences between non-renewable and renewable energy and how the global population has risen with the wider availability of different energy sources. They are also aware of the benefits and negatives of different energy sources and tried to use this information to investigate what types of energy source would benefit different settlements. To finish, the children put all this learning together to think about the school itself and what renewable energy source it would be better for the school to switch to and where the equipment needed should be positioned for best effect, safety, and aesthetics!

<u>PE</u>

As well as improving their tennis swings in time for Wimbledon, the children have taken part in OAA in PE. A really fun topic that not only involves physical movement but also concentrates on teamwork, communication and careful thought. The children have worked really well to overcome a variety of different challenges where they have had to collaborate with their whole team or failure loomed!






