### <u>Intent</u>

At Our Lady of Peace, our aim is to see our children form happy and rich memories in R.E. formed through an engaging and comprehensive curriculum enabling them to develop a living and personal faith in Jesus Christ and allowing them to know and love God and understand the world around them. As a Catholic school, the RE curriculum is central to the whole school curriculum and with our Gospel values, underpins all teaching.



As teachers through high quality teaching, we will engage children's intellect, heart and imagination, inspiring enthusiasm and interest in RE. Children will develop the appropriate subject knowledge, skills and understanding to fulfil their potential and meet Diocesan Standards for Primary Religious Education.

Our curriculum coverage allows all learners to access the content, make progress through the curriculum and designed to encourage creativity, imagination, enquiry, debate, discussion and independence. Children will develop a well-formed conscience allowing them to make sound moral judgements in the light of personal commitment to God.

Each child will feel they belong to our school community and are not excluded because they are not Catholic. Lessons should be places where everyone is respected for their beliefs and expressions of faith and where ultimately, they all achieve.

Children will be prepared for life in a multi faith society by fostering respect for and understanding of rich cultural diversity. They will develop a real understanding and appreciation of the world and be able to reflect on their own beliefs, values and experiences.

#### **Implementation**

- With the help of God and the Archdiocese to implement a R.E. curriculum whereby the Catholic faith permeates everything we do.
- R.E. is a core subject and all children will study RE for 2 hours and 30 minutes per week. The curriculum hours in R.E. are non-negotiable and will be followed by all staff in the school.
- Religious Education is taught throughout the school using the 'Come and See' programme. 'Come and See' is an invitation and a promise of life for everyone and is open to all. In response to the question 'Where do you live?', Jesus invited his disciples to 'Come and See.' They went with Jesus 'and spent the rest of that day with him.'
- Each year group will study a number of units over the year. The units are developmental, building on previous knowledge and experience and considering the children's age and understanding.
- The topics covered by each year group are as detailed on the curriculum overview.
- Assessment follows the 3-year cycle as outlined by the Diocese.
- Approaches will include whole class teaching, group activities and individual work. Children will have opportunities to work individually as well as cooperatively and collaboratively, developing their own knowledge and expertise as well as sharing experiences with others.
- High quality teaching responds to the needs of children.
- Leaders ensure that ongoing CPD is available for staff to ensure curriculum requirements are met.
- Leaders at all levels, including governors regularly review and quality assure the subject to ensure that it is implemented sufficiently well.
- Children who will be highly engaged in R.E. lessons through the use of a variety of sources such as religious stories, scripture, religious artwork, songs, music, dance and religious signs and symbols.
- The life and work of key figures in the History of the people of God will be studied, for example, lives of the saints.
- The use of visits and visitors in school will enhance the RE curriculum.

- The children can make links between Jesus' life and teaching and link it to their own lives and those of others in their community and in the wider world, developing an understanding of other people's cultures and ways of life.
- Children will be able to reflect and consider important questions about RE.
