

## **NURSERY**

What a fantastic start to 2025 we've had in Nursery! We've been busy learning, exploring, and having fun in many different areas over this Spring 1 term. Here's an update on the wonderful activities we've been engaging with during the first part of the Spring term.

#### Mathematics: Shape, Space, and Measure

In maths, we've been exploring shape, space, and measure. The children have enjoyed comparing the sizes of the three bears, exploring lengths, and comparing weights using a variety of old and new scales and jugs in the water tray. These hands-on activities have been a great way to introduce the children to important mathematical concepts in a fun and interactive way.

### **Number Day and Money**

Number Day was a big highlight! The children loved learning about money, and we linked this to nursery rhymes, reinforcing the idea of counting and value. The children have been busy practicing counting coins and using their understanding of numbers in real-life contexts linked to the 5 current bun nursery rhyme.

#### **Literacy: Stories and Retelling**

In Literacy, we've explored a variety of fantastic books. We've enjoyed retelling the classic tale of *Goldilocks* and the Three Bears and We're Going on a Bear Hunt. We've also read How to Catch a Star and Meg and Mog. These books have been wonderful for learning about positional language and joining in with stories using repeated refrains. The children have really enjoyed participating and retelling stories in their own words. The highlight of the term was going on our Goldilocks investigation and it was a true delight to see how engaged and exited the children were about their learning.

#### **Religious Education: From Galilee to Jerusalem**

In RE, we began by learning about the story of the Epiphany and the Three Wise Men and the children loved making crowns and wrapping gifts for birthdays. As the term progressed, we then moved on to discuss how Jesus loves us and wants us to love and care for one another. The children learned about the story of *Jesus Feeds the 5000* and other stories that focus on friendship, sharing, and kindness. These lessons have sparked some thoughtful discussions about how we treat others and how we can show our school values in class by respecting each other and the Nursery toys.



















### **NURSERY CONTINUED**

### **Understanding the World: Seasons and Space**

In Understanding the World, we've looked at how the season changes from autumn to winter. We went on a season scavenger hunt looking for the changes in the environment around them. The children have also enjoyed exploring the theme of space, creating space-themed artwork and constellation pictures. This has been a great way for them to learn about the wonders of the universe and the stars above us and share lots of lovely fiction and non-fiction texts around the topic.

#### **Mindfulness and Emotions**

The children have also had many mindful moments this term. We've spent time talking about emotions and learning how to understand and express our feelings. The children have enjoyed participating in activities that promote calmness and self-awareness.

### **Phonics: Rhyme and Letter Sounds**

In Phonics, we've been learning about rhyming words and exploring new letter sounds. The children have had fun identifying the first letter of their names and thinking about other words that start with the same sounds. This is a great foundation for their early reading skills!

#### **Role Play and Outdoor Learning**

The role play area has been a huge hit with the children, especially the *Three Bears Cottage*. The children have enjoyed engaging in imaginative play, recreating stories and creating their own adventures. They've also loved exploring the forest area and visiting the Hobbit's Hut, where they have shared stories and enjoyed the outdoors.

#### **Looking Ahead**

We're looking forward to more exciting learning opportunities in the coming weeks linked to our next terms topic of animals and vets. We hope you enjoy photos of our learning from this half term.

## **RECEPTION**

This term in Literacy, we had a fantastic time exploring the story *Harry and the Bucketful of Dinosaurs*! The children enjoyed reading about Harry's adventures with his dinosaur friends and used the story to help develop their writing skills. Our main focus was on forming simple sentences correctly by remembering to use capital letters at the beginning, finger spaces between words, and full stops at the end. The children worked really hard on this and made great progress! We have now zoomed into space with our new book, *Astro Girl*. This exciting story will inspire our learning as we continue to develop our writing skills while exploring the wonders of space. We can't wait to see where our imaginations take us!









The children have also been busy developing their maths skills through lots of hands-on learning and fun activities! We explored the numbers 6, 7, and 8, learning to recognize, count, and represent them in different ways. The children also had great fun investigating length by comparing and measuring objects and exploring mass by using balance scales to see which items were heavier or lighter. We also introduced the concept of odd and even numbers, helping the children spot patterns and group numbers in pairs. Doubling was another exciting topic, where the children practiced making doubles using objects and pictures. A highlight of the term was *Number Day*, where we celebrated maths with fun games, challenges, and problem-solving activities. It was wonderful to see the children's enthusiasm and confidence growing!



















## **RECEPTION CONTINUED**

This term, our Reception children have been curious explorers, discovering so many exciting topics in *Understanding the World!* We started by learning all about *dinosaurs*, finding out their names, what they ate, and how they lived. We even became little palaeontologists, investigating *fossils* and how they help us learn about the past. We also celebrated *Chinese New Year*, exploring the traditions, food, and stories behind this special festival. The children enjoyed learning about the zodiac animals, making decorations, and even trying some Chinese-inspired activities. To end the term, we turned our attention to *space*, looking at planets, astronauts, and rockets! The children were fascinated by the idea of traveling to the moon and loved sharing their thoughts on what they might find in space.









This term in RE, the children have enjoyed listening to and exploring special stories that teach us about kindness, faith, and inclusion. We began by learning about *The Story of the Three Wise Men*, discovering how they followed the bright star to find baby Jesus and bring him special gifts. The children loved retelling the story and thinking about what gifts they might give to someone special. We also explored *The Story of Jesus Feeding the 5000*, where Jesus performed a miracle by sharing a small amount of food with a huge crowd. This story helped us think about generosity and the importance of sharing with others. Another story we enjoyed was *Jesus and the Children*, which reminded us that everyone is important and valued. The children talked about how they feel special and how they can show kindness to others. To finish the term, we read *The Big Umbrella*, a wonderful book about inclusion and welcoming everyone, no matter who they are. This led to some lovely discussions about friendship and making sure everyone feels safe and included in our school community.







In Art the children have been busy exploring their creativity through a variety of exciting art activities! We began by making our very own *colour books*, where the children experimented with mixing colours and learning how different shades are created. It was wonderful to see their excitement as they discovered new colours and proudly added their creations to their books. When learning about *dinosaurs*, we had lots of fun using *pasta* to make dinosaur skeletons. The children carefully arranged different pasta shapes to form bones and learned about the structure of dinosaur skeletons in a hands-on, creative way. As part of our *space* topic, we used watercolours to paint beautiful pictures of planets. The children explored different painting

techniques, blending colours to create swirling galaxies and unique planets full of imagination. Throughout the term, we have encouraged the children to explore different *materials* and use their imagination to create unique works of art. From painting and collage to junk modelling and printing, it has been fantastic to see their confidence and creativity grow!



## **RECEPTION CONTINUED**


This term in PE, the children have been developing their movement skills through a variety of fun and engaging activities! We worked on our *fine motor skills* by practicing *cutting skills*, helping the children strengthen their hand muscles and improve their control when using scissors. These activities also support early writing skills by building dexterity and coordination. For *gross motor skills*, we focused on using our whole bodies to move in different ways, such as jumping, running, balancing, and climbing. The children had great fun developing their strength and coordination through obstacle courses and active games. To support well-being, we introduced *mindful movement*, encouraging the children to slow down, stretch, and focus on their breathing. Through simple yoga poses and relaxation exercises, they learned how movement can help them feel calm and focused.

This term in PSED (Personal, Social, and Emotional Development), the children have been learning important skills to help them understand their feelings, build positive relationships, and stay safe. We focused on *friendship*, talking about what it means to be a good friend and how we can show kindness to others. Through stories, role-play, and group discussions, the children practiced taking turns, sharing, and using kind words to build strong friendships. During *Children's Mental Health Week*, we explored different ways to look after our well-being. The children learned about expressing their feelings, using calming strategies, and the importance of talking to someone if they feel sad or worried. Activities like mindfulness exercises, breathing techniques, and positive affirmations helped the children understand how to care for their mental health. We also learned about *Internet Safety*, discussing how to stay safe when using devices. The children were introduced to simple rules, such as asking an adult for help, only using safe and trusted websites, and never sharing personal information online. These important lessons help build a strong foundation for staying safe in the digital world.

It has been a fantastic term of exploring, learning and having fun and we look forward to all the exciting things that are coming in the next term.

### YEAR 1

#### **Religious Education**

<u>Galilee to Jerusalem:</u> This topic focused on Jesus's life. The children looked at his early years and visits to the temple, how he chose his disciples, how important children were and how he set a good example for us to live our lives by.

#### **English:**

The children studied the text "Tiger Walk" which focused on a character's emotions as they went on a journey as well as descriptions of the places they visited. They focussed on using exciting adjectives to make the reader want to continue to read more. They continued to work on their handwriting, spelling, grammar and punctuation. They continued to practice to use their "VIPERS" skills to help them understand new texts and also to read information in other lessons too.

#### Maths

In the topic of place value, the children consolidated their knowledge of the following areas: counting to 20 forwards and backwards, beginning with 0 or 1, or from any number. Counting, reading and writing numbers to 20 in numerals and words. Identifying one more or one less than a given number. Identifying and representing numbers using objects and pictorial representations including the number line, and used the language of: equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most, least.

In the topic of Number: Addition and subtraction within 20 the children consolidated their learning of the following areas: Representing and using number bonds and related subtraction facts within 20. Reading, writing and interpreting mathematical statements involving addition (+), subtraction (-) and equals (=) signs. Adding and subtracting one-digit and two-digit numbers to 20, including zero. Solving one step problems that involved addition and subtraction, using concrete objects and pictorial representations, and missing number problems such as 7= \_\_ -9

### **Phonics**

The children continued to learn some more of the phase 5 phonemes and graphemes, are working hard on the correct use of the split digraphs: a-e, e-e, i-e, o-e and u-e. They are starting to apply this phonic knowledge more in their writing in all areas of the curriculum.

#### **Science**

The topic on Seasonal Changes looked at how the weather changes per season and how this affects plants and animal. They studied how people prepare for each season and the special events that happen in each season.

#### **History**

Spreading the word: in this topic the children looked at how William Caxton and Alexander Graham Bell helped develop new ways of communicating and how these ways have developed since then. They learnt how Caxton's use of the printing press enabled books to be made quicker than before and that this meant that they were more readily available for everyone to enjoy. They learnt about the invention of the telephone changed the way people communicated for ever and that telephones are continuing to develop further each day.

#### Art


Flora and Fauna: the children will study artists who used drawing as a way to capture the way plants and insects look and they then had the opportunity to try different media to create their own images of flora and fauna.


#### Computing


Digital painting: The children learnt about how to choose appropriate tools in a program to create art, and made comparisons with working completed via a non-digital way.



## YEAR 2

### Year 2 Spring Term 1

We have had a busy and exciting term in Year 2.

In Science, we explored Materials through hands-on investigations. We investigated which materials to recommend to the three pigs to build their house, later we experimented with different materials to make an outfit to protect Humpty Dumpty when he falls off his wall. We discovered a hat made of foil worked especially well. We discovered that we could change materials too, for example we learned that when you fold paper it stays folded and you can stretch some kinds of plastic.

In our Art lessons we learned to print a design using carbon paper. We discovered that we were good at observational drawing of small objects like buttons, coins and feathers. We used these as motifs in our artwork when we printed a design and because we learned how to print, we repeated motifs in our artwork. We were inspired by an artist named, Xgaoc'o Xare from Botswana.

In Maths, our Year 2 mathematicians have been busy exploring money, and they have loved applying their learning to real-life situations! We began by counting pence and pounds, using both coins and notes to build our confidence in recognising and understanding their values. As we progressed, we explored different ways to make the same amount, discovering that we could use various combinations of coins to reach the same total. Afterwards, we moved on to comparing amounts and calculating with money, helping us to solve real-world problems. A highlight for many was learning how to make a pound and work out change, which we practised through role-play activities and problem-solving challenges. To extend our thinking, during Number Day, we tackled two-step problems, combining skills to find totals and give the correct change—just like in a real shop! This unit has been a fantastic way for children to see the practical importance of maths, and we have been so impressed with their enthusiasm and problem-solving skills. We look forward to more exciting challenges next half term where we will explore multiplication and division!

In History, our Year 2 historians delved into the remarkable lives of William and Caroline Herschel, sibling astronomers whose ground-breaking work has left an indelible mark. We were fascinated to learn that they conducted much of their pioneering research in Slough, where they constructed a monumental 40-foot telescope—a feat of engineering that was truly ahead of its time. William Herschel, originally from Hanover, Germany, settled in England and became a prominent astronomer. He is best known for discovering the planet Uranus in 1781, expanding our understanding of the solar system. His sister, Caroline Herschel, was not only his assistant but also an accomplished astronomer in her own right. She discovered several comets and was the first woman to receive a salary as a scientist. The Herschels' contributions have had a lasting impact on astronomy, inspiring future generations of scientists. Their story has captivated our students, highlighting the power of curiosity, dedication, and sibling collaboration in achieving extraordinary scientific advancements.



## **YEAR 2 CONTINUED**



#### A Special Visit from the UK Space Agency





Year 2 had an exciting visit from Mrs. Akar, a parent who works for the UK Space Agency, to talk about the incredible contributions of William and Caroline Herschel to science. The children (and adults!) were thrilled to learn from someone in the space industry and had lots of questions to ask.

Mrs. Akar delivered a fascinating presentation filled with engaging facts, pictures, and videos about space exploration, including missions studying the Sun, Earth's climate, and even Jupiter's icy moons! The children were especially amazed to learn about efforts to clean up space junk and how scientists are working to understand our planet and beyond.

It was a truly inspiring session that left everyone excited about the wonders of space!

## YEAR 3

#### **Religious Education**

In Topic 4 we have been learning about the Christian life and how we journey with Christ and share in His way of life. We also learned about the liturgical year which celebrates the key events of Jesus' life. We have just begun Topic 5 which teaches us about how to listen and share what we have with others. Currently, we are learning about the significance of the different parts of the Mass and how we participate in it.

In our class liturgy, we reflected on the importance of sharing what we love with others and how at times this could be difficult.













### **English**

In English we have been learning a range of skills to describe a setting. Children have been using a range of skills to create images in the mind of a reader using their senses.

#### Maths

In Mathematics, we have been practising skills to improve our multiplication and division. We have used a range of strategies to find solutions to solving multi-step problems. Children have become more confident about applying their knowledge of timetables with greater accuracy.

#### **Number day**

Our celebration of Number Day was filled with exciting activities as we learned about the work and life of Ada Lovelace who was the first computer programmer. Children answered calculations to decode messages; they cut, ordered and measured the width of hand prints then competed to see which team could build the highest tower and measure it accurately!





















## **YEAR 3 CONTINUED**

#### Science

In Science we have been learning about the properties of magnets and how they behave around other metals. Children were able to identify which objects attracted and repelled by magnets. We thought carefully about what these materials might contain.











#### History

In Year 3 the children have been studying the Ancient Egyptians. We reflected on the Ancient Egyptian beliefs, where they were buried and how their bodies were prepared for burial. Children had an opportunity to mummify a tomato by scooping out the flesh and laying it in a mixture of bicarbonate of soda and table salt.

#### PΕ

Pupils have been developing balancing, rolling and jumping. They have used these skills individually and in combination. They have also been developing their sequencing work collaborating with others to use matching and contrasting actions and shapes.



## YEAR 4

This term in Year 4, we had a fantastic time engaging in fun activities and exciting learning experiences!

As part of our history topic, we visited Ufton Court, where we spent the day exploring Viking life. We investigated their laws and punishment system, learned about their everyday life, and even practiced Viking battle skills!

In English, the children enjoyed writing warning stories, showcasing their creativity and imagination. We focused on the setting description and the children have significantly improved their vocabulary and figurative language.

Number Day in maths was a particular highlight! We learned about the famous mathematician Carl Friedrich Gauss and applied our mathematical knowledge to solve real-life problems. The children really enjoyed dressing up and came up with some very interesting and creative costumes.

Focusing on well-being and mindfulness was also important to us this term. During Children's Mental Health Week, we took time for meditation, helping the children relax, reflect, and enjoy mindfulness activities.

In art, we explored still life, studying the work of famous still-life artists: Paul Cezanne, Baas Meeuws and Hirasho Sato. Inspired by these artists, the children created their own still life artwork. They even created their patterned paper to use on their still life collage.

Our science lessons were filled with exciting investigations! We explored states of matter, tested the viscosity of different ketchups to find the best one for a hot dog, and experimented with the best way to melt chocolate.

Finally, in RE, we looked closely at our local church, learning about the important roles community members play in supporting the church.

It has been a fantastic term, and we look forward to more exciting learning adventures ahead!





## YEAR 5

### Science

The Year 5 pupils have been learning about the properties and changes of materials through a series of investigations. They have learnt that Materials have different uses depending on their properties and state (liquid, solid, gas). Properties include hardness, transparency, electrical and thermal conductivity and attraction to magnets. Great fun has been had by all by trying to separate a range of mixtures by filtering, sieving and evaporation.

We wish all the families and pupils of Year 5 a happy and peaceful half term.





### **Numeracy Day**


Only last week, the children had the pleasure of celebrating NSPCC Number Day 2025 (Celebrating 25years). Yr5 researched a living famous mathematician, who promotes the public's understanding of mathematics, Hannah Fry.

We also did a fun investigation, allowing the children to combine their Art and DT skills, to develop their learning of how to apply their knowledge of area, perimeter, volume and 3D shapes to construct a city landscape.

Hannah Fry. Hannah M. Fry HonFREng FIMA FIET (born 21 February 1984) is a British mathematician, author and broadcaster. As of 2025 she is the Professor of the Public Understanding of Mathematics at the University of Cambridge and president of the Institute of Mathematics and its Applications (IMA).




## **YEAR 5 CONTINUED**




### **English**

This term the pupils have been writing suspense stories. We have been reading an excellent example of the genre as our daily reader: 'Dead Man's Cove'. We have studied the features of a suspense story and used them in our own writing. We have tried to make our stories full of suspense by giving details about the setting, such as the weather, how light or dark it is and how the place makes the characters feel. The pupils produced many excellent pieces of gripping suspense, a few are displayed below.









## **YEAR 5 CONTINUED**

### <u>Art</u>

This term we have been learning about landscape drawings and artists. We have studied the work of artists such as Kitty Jones and he Shoreditch Sketcher and tried to model our work on theirs. We have used a variety of media for creating our artwork, including pastels, colouring pencils, collage and watercolours. We have created landscapes that reflect the natural world as well as the man-made. Here are a few examples!









## YEAR 6

In art this half term, the children have been creating a self-portrait in the style of Mike Barrett. The unit began with the children entering 'Portrait Club', in which they had lots of fun striking various poses, so that their peers could draw them. This allowed them practice in observational skills – drawing what is <u>actually there</u>, rather than what they think they see. After this, the children then produced their own self-portrait, upon which they later experimented with hatching and cross-hatching to create shadowy effects. Finally, pupils created a background (using an array of different medium such as newspaper cut-outs, pieces of coloured card, watercolour paints, oil pastels and many more) to stick their portrait on. Mike Barrett encourages artists to express their identity through their artwork, so the children tried hard to express their personalities, hobbies, like and dislikes through their portraits. They are still a work in progress and not completely finished yet but we look forward to sharing the final pieces with you!















## **YEAR 6 CONTINUED**

In history this half term, Year 6 have been learning about the Early Islamic Civilisation. We began by looking at the legacy of this period in history: how has it affected our lives today and what have they left behind? We discovered that they were hugely influential in medicine and pharmaceuticals, astronomy, literature and maths – they even created their own number system (Arabic numerals) which we still use today. Following on from this, we looked at architectural structures in Baghdad and Cordoba, exploring homes from the time and comparing these to homes in Anglo-Saxon Britain during the same period. The children also used written sources to make a replica blue print of what the city of Baghdad would have looked like at the time; have a look at their super drawings below.

In RE we have studied the gospel of John, looking closely at the seven signs and how each one shows Jesus' divine nature but also His human nature. This was followed by looking at the seven 'I am 'statements in John's gospel and how each time Jesus is telling us both that He is God – but also something of what God is like. The children were able to get artistic and show their understanding of one of the I am statements in art work, thinking carefully about the images and colours they used. They then presented these to the rest of the class. They followed this by looking at different famous works of art of one of the statements – I am the bread of life. The children were able to annotate the art, showing their understanding of the choice of colours and symbols used by the artist and sharing their findings with the class.


